The 2021 Sandhill Crane Festival at Birchwood is Cancelled. There is no word as to whether the viewing platform at Hiwassee Refuge will be open. Your editor will certainly miss his annual pilgrimage to Birchwood.

The Soddy Mountain Hawk Count had a busy year. I recently spoke to Bill Haley, former editor of the *Chattanooga Chat* about his twenty-seven years (so far) of counting the hawks from Soddy Mountain. He and his volunteers are careful to count only migrating hawks and leave resident birds off the count. This year, he was present for at least part of each of the 66 days (341.5 hours) counting hawks, including 14 species in 2021.

Barry Lopez, author of the National Book award winning *Arctic Dreams* died on Christmas day, 2020. Lopez was 75 years old and had spent large portions of his life traveling the seven continents in the company of researchers and indigenous persons. In addition to the National Book award, he had won a Guggenheim Fellowship and the John Burroughs Medal for nature writing from the John Burroughs Natural History Society. He spent 30 years on his final book, *Horizon*, in which he documented his travels. He published

several other books while working on *Horizon*.

Here is a quotation from his essay "Landscape and narrative:" Published in *Crossing Open Ground*, a collection of essays.

The power of narrative to nurture and heal, to repair a spirit in disarray, rests on two things: the skillful innovation of unimpeachable sources and a listener's knowledge that no hypocrisy or subterfuge is involved. This last simple fact is to me one of the most imposing aspects of the Holocene history of man.

Most of his books address nature, and each of them is a great read.
